VISION

To achieve these aims, the College endeavours to provide a congenial atmosphere in which the best in each student is brought out. We believe that the ethos of the College should be conducive to the flowering of the students' personality. The dynamics of the educational process should foster the harmonious growth of the four facets of personality of the growing students – mental, physical, emotional and moral. Keeping these objectives in mind, the college offers co-educational facilities to the generation for their empowerment in all spheres of lives.

LOCATION

Margherita College was established in the year 1978 and is located on a sprawling pollution free campus of 26 (Twenty six) bighas of land in the North-Eastern state of Assam guarded by the majestic Patkai Hills in the Head quarter of Margherita Sub-Division. Margherita lies exactly 567 kms. east of Guwahati. The Patkai hills which form a gateway of India in the North-East are situated in the South-Eastern corner of Assam between 26.30° North latitude and 95.15° East longitude making the natural boundary between Assam and Burma presently Myanmar. Margherita, the township near Ledo from where the historic Stilwell road connects the North-East region of India with China via Myanmar is the centre of what could be a rich economic zone of South-East Asia. The College is the eastern most Provincialised College in Assam catering to the higher academic needs of a diverse population including several indigenous and ethnic communities.

The College campus is within 50 metres of the National Highway No. 38 and is connected by both road and rail communications. Mohanbari (Dibrugarh) airport is only 100 kms. off from the college.





THE COLLEGE INFRASTRUCTURE

LIBRARY

The college has a Central Library with computer facilities. The students as well as the teachers are amply benefitted by the books, journals, periodicals and information available in the library. There is provision of a good reading room with Xerox facility. Internet facility is available to the students on need basis. The college library has also been upgraded through automation and networking in collaboration with INFLIBNET, Ahmedabad. Now the teaching staff and students are taking the benefits of Information and Communication Technology in accessing knowledge and resources including the best E-journals, E-books and research papers. Besides, the library has the Book Bank facility for poor and needy students.

In addition to the Central Library of the college, some individual departments are also maintaining departmental library with collection of books from different sources for their own use.

COMPUTER INFRASTRUCTURE

The college Computer Centre has a well equipped Computer Lab with state-of-art infrastracture with all necessary peripherals. The Computer Centre imparts training / education in various periodic courses leading to Diplomas and Certificates in Computer Education at very reasonable rates of fees with the added facilities of highly qualified faculty, continuous power supply and high academic content of the course.

LANGUAGE LAB

The College has a state of the art infrastructure Language Lab. Financed by RUSA. CLOSE CIRCUIT MONITORING SYSTEM

24 Hrs observation and monitoring of the College campus is done through CC TV as a part of efficient management.

SMART BOARD, LCD & OVERHEAD PROJECTORS

The college has modern electronics gadgets like Smart Boards, Visualizers, Podium, LCD and Overhead projectors with other modern necessary infrastructure for organising Shows /Presentations /Seminars /Conferences etc.


MARGHERITA COLLEGE ECONOMIC FORUM

The college runs its various activities as per the Annual Academic Calender adopted at the beginning of each academic session. The academic schedule of the college provides for lot of home assignments, guided tutorials, group discussions, etc. both within and outside the class room.

The college stands for a high sense of discipline and moral values. Obedience to and regard for rules is given utmost importance. Any breach of good manners, courtesy and etiquette or any action likely to lower the good name of the college is regarded as a breach of discipline. Wearing of Uniform and Badge is compulsory. The dress code is

BOY'S-*White Shirt and black trousers & Black Sweater.

GIRL'S-*White Salwar and Kurta with sky-blue Chunni & Black Sweater.

OR

*Muga coloured Mekhela with blue bordered white Chaddar and white blouse. *Specification of Dress Code: No borderline with other coloured stripes in the white background of shirting. Kurti for girls should be below the knee & white leggings for girls are barred.

- * A fine of Rs. 500/- is imposed on uniform breakers.
- * Mobile use amongst students would be restricted if and when found being used leisurely.

ATTENDANCE

Students' attendance in class is compulsory. Every student must attend at least 75% of the lectures delivered in each subject to be eligible for appearing in the University and Council examinations as a regular student.

A student who attends at least 60% of the lectures delivered shall, however, be allowed to appear in the examination as a non-collegiate candidate on payment of prescribed fee. Further, no candidate shall be allowed to appear in the University and Council examinations with below 60% of attendance in the classes.

RULES FOR THE GENERAL ELECTION TO MARGHERITA COLLEGE STUDENTS' UNION

2020– 2021

To elect the Margherita College Students' Union (MCSU), 2020–21 by direct participation of the students through secret ballot system, the following rules will apply:

- 1. The candidates /voters /proposers /seconders must be regular and full time students of Margherita College and should not be distance /proximate education students. They must be enrolled in a full time course, the course duration being at least one year. Further, they must have cleared their dues up to August 2020.
- 2. The students of Higher Secondary level are not eligible to contest the election. Only the undergraduate level students within the age group of 17–22 years are eligible to contest the election; provided that such an intending candidate does not have any backlog of subject (s) in the preceding 1st to 4th Semester exams, and is not an unsuccessful candidate of the examination which the candidate is scheduled to appear during the year of contesting the election.
- 3. A student who already contested in any preceding year for any office under the MCSU (whether elected or not) shall not qualify to contest for any portfolio during the current year.
- 4. A student intending to contest for Executive Member (class representative) of the MCSU must not have contested more than once for such a position in any of the preceding elections of MCSU.

- 5. The candidate should have attained the minimum of 75% attendance in classes / lectures, each paper / subject.
- 6. The candidate must not have a previous criminal record or faced any disciplinary action from the college authority.
- 7. One Proposer can't propose more than one candidate.
- 8. One Supporter can't support more than one candidate.
- 9. Only Girl candidates can contest for the office of the Girls' Common Room. While the candidature for Boys' Common Room must come from boys only.
- 10. The candidates must invariably be from that class from which he / she is contesting for class representatives.
- 11. The maximum permitted election expenditure per candidate shall be Rs. 5000/- and the candidates have to submit the Audited account (if the expenditure is incurred) to the college authority within two weeks after declaration of the result.
- 12. The election of the candidate will be nullified in the event of any noncompliance or in the event of any excessive expenditure.
- 13. There shall be no appeal on caste or communal lines for securing votes and criticism of other candidate (s) shall be restricted to their policies & programmes and past record of work. No criticism on private life of the candidate is allowed.
- 14. No candidate shall be permitted to make use of printed poster, printed pamphlets, or any other printed material, for the purpose of canvassing.
- 15. No candidate shall be permitted to carry out procession, or public meetings, or in any way canvas or distribute propaganda outside the college campus.
- 16. The use of loud speaker, vehicles and animals for the purpose of convassing shall be prohibited.
- 17. Casting time will be from 10.00 a.m. to 1.00 p.m. and counting will be from 1.30 p.m. on the specific date.
- 18. The Returning officer has the right to cancel any nomination paper if found improper.
- 19. Two sets of nomination paper can be submitted by a contesting candidate.
- 20. The candidates along with the proposer and seconder must be present with their college uniform at the time of scrutiny of the nomination papers.



- 21. The nomination paper can be collected from the college office during office hours on payment of Rs. 15/- only per nomination paper on specific date.
- 22. No voter is allowed to caste his/her vote without his/her college Identity Card.
- 23. No candidate who has financial irregularities with the college will be eligible to contest the General Election.
- 24. The office bearers and the Executive members of the Students' Union shall have to attend the college with uniform during the college hours for all purposes.
- 25. If any dispute arises in connection with the election, the decision of Election Commissioner will be final and binding to all.
- 26. During the period of election, no person, who is not a student on the rolls of the college, shall be permitted to take part or interfare in the election process in either way.
- 27. Contravention of any of the above rules may make the candidate liable to be stripped off his /her candidature or his/her elected post as the case may be. The Margherita College authority may also take appropriate disciplinary action against such a violator.



Note: It is desirable that the students intending to offer Physics, Chemistry as elective subjects must offer Mathematics also as one of the elective subjects.

General Information:

- Syllabi for Statistics, Economics, Mathematics, Computer Science & Application, EVS are the same for Arts, Commerce and Science streams.
- It is desired that students of all streams shall choose their elective subjects keeping in view their courses of higher studies in general and other professional courses.

 Every learner at the +2 stage would be required to participate compulsorily in an area of co-curricular activities (CCA) out of NCC, NSS, Rover /Ranger, Games and Sports (Any one from Athletic and other games), Cultural and Literary, Debating and Quiz.



Under Graduate Programmes (New):

CBCS (CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM):

As recommended by the 120th Meeting of Under Graduate Board held on 19.11.2018, the 115th Meeting of the Academic Council held on 21.11.2018 vide Resolution No. 03 has approved the Dibrugarh University Regulations for the Under Graduate Programmes in the Choice Based Credit System, 2018, which has come into effect 2019-2020 academic session.

CBCS (Choice Based Credit System) is a flexible system of learning. 'Credit' defines the quantum of contents/ syllabus prescribed for a course and determines the number of hours of instructions required per week. Thus normally in each of the course, credits are assigned on the basis of the number of lectures/ tutorials/ laboratory work and other forms of learning required to complete the course contents in a 14-15 week schedule:

- 1) 1 Lecture per week = 1 Hour duration per week= 1 credit
- 2) 1 Tutorial per week = 1 Hour duration per week= 1 credit
- 3) 1 Practical per week = 2 Hour duration per week= 1 credit

Note: The lecture sessions and tutorials shall not be substituted with any other activities like seminars, group discussions etc.

CBCS system permits the students to-

- 1) Learn at their own pace.
- Choose electives from a wide range of Elective Courses offered for the programme.
- 3) Undergo additional courses and acquire more than the required number of credits
- 4) Adopt an inter-disciplinary approach in learning.
- 5) Make best use of the expertise of available faculty.

COURSE STRUCTURE:

The nature of the Courses for all Under Graduate Academic programmes shall be as below:

- Core Courses: Compulsory components of an Academic Programme. These Courses are
 to be compulsorily studied as a core requirement for the programme. The contents of the
 Core Courses shall be as per the UGC Model Curriculum for the subject/ discipline
 concerned.
- 2. Elective Courses: Elective courses shall be chosen by each student from a pool of courses. These courses may be intra-departmental, i.e. Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) as well as inter-departmental, i.e., Generic Elective (GE). The students shall have to choose minimum number of DSE and GE in every semester as prescribed in the Course Structure. These courses shall be:
 - supportive to the discipline of study
 - ii. providing an expanded scope
 - iii. enabling an exposure to some other discipline/ domain
 - iv. nurturing student proficiency/ skill
- 3. Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC): The Ability Enhancement Courses shall be of two kinds- 'Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses' and 'Skill Enhancement Courses'. These courses shall be inter-disciplinary (within the Programme) in nature. 'AEC' Courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to Knowledge enhancement.



 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC): (a) Environmental Science (2 Credit), (b) Communicative English (2 Credit) and (c) Alternative English/Communicative Hindi /MIL (2 Credit).

For BA and B.Com Programmes, there shall be a Multi-disciplinary Course of 4 Credits.

II. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC): (minimum 4 credits): These courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide value-based and/or skill-based knowledge and should contain both theory and lab/ handson/ training/fieldwork. The main purpose of these courses is to provide students life-skills in hands-on mode so as to increase their employability.

** Attendance: A student who has less than 80% attendance in average shall not be permitted to sit for the End-semester examination. Provided that it shall be open to the University to grant exemption to a student who has attended a minimum of 70% classes but failed to obtain the prescribed 80% attendance for valid reasons, on recommendation of the Principals of the College on payment of a prescribed fee(s). The Principals of the Colleges shall announce the names of all students who shall not be eligible to take the End-semester examinations in the various courses and send a copy of the same to the Controller of Examinations. Such candidates shall have to repeat the concerned course (s) when it is offered next.

Rules for Internal Assessment in C.B.C.S. (B.A. /B.Sc./ B.Com. Programmes) in Semester System

- The marks allotted for Internal Assessment (20%) in each course shall be based on the following:
 - a) Sessional Examination I (Written): 25% of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
 - b) Sessional Examination II (Written): 25% of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
 - c) Seminar/ Group Discussion: 25 % of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
 - d) Attendance: 25 % of the marks allotted for internal assessment.
- 2. Each sessional examination shall be conducted by the concerned teacher(s) of the course. The setting of question paper, invigilation duty, evaluation of answer scripts for each paper shall be done by the concerned teacher(s) as a part of his/her/their normal duty. The teacher concerned shall fix the date of the sessional examination of each course complying with the Academic Calendar of the University.
- The students shall have to write the answers in the scripts provided and duly authenticated by the college/institute concerned.
- After evaluation, the answer scripts should be shown to the students and corrections should be made if necessary. After this, the answer scripts should be collected back from the students.
- There shall be no provision for "repeat"/ "betterment" in the sessional examination. If a student misses any sessional examination for unavoidable reasons, the concerned teacher may allow the student to appear in a separate examination at his/her own discretion.
- The marks of internal assessment secured by a candidate shall be carried over to next legitimate chances.
- If a course is taught by more than one teacher then the concerned teachers shall conduct the process of internal assessment together.
- If any student fails to appear in internal assessment, he/she shall not be eligible to appear
 in the end semester examinations of the course(s) concerned. The colleges/ institutes shall
 notify the same prior to filling up forms for examinations.
- At the end of the semester (before the end-semester examinations begin) the concerned College shall submit the internal assessment marks in proper format to the University.
- The University may call the answer scripts from the colleges/ institute at any time during the academic sessions.

ATTENDANCE, EXAMINATION & EVALUATION: [FOR SCIENCE, ARTS & COMMERCE UNDER DEGREE SEMESTER SYSTEM (OLD)]:

1. Attendance:

- A student who has less than 80% attendance shall not be permitted to sit for the End-semester examination in the course in which the shortfall exists.
 - Provided that it shall be open to the University to grant exemption to a student who has attended a minimum of 70% classes but failed to obtain the prescribed 80% attendance for valid reasons on recommendation of the Head/Director/Coordinator of the Department Centre on payment of a prescribed fee(s).
- The Principal of the college/institute with recommendation of the Heads of the Departments shall announce the names of all students who shall not be eligible to appear in the End-semester examinations in the various courses due to non-fulfilment of the criteria of internal assessment and attendance, and send a copy of the same to the University. In such cases, the student shall have to re-enroll in the relevant course(s) with the next batch.

2. Examination and Evaluation:

- a) Examination and evaluation shall be done on a continuous basis, at least three times during each semester.
- b) There shall be 20% marks for internal assessment and 80% marks for Endsemester examination in each course during every semester.
- c) There shall be no provision for re-evaluation of the end semester examinations. However, a candidate may apply for re-scrutiny.

d) Internal Assessment :

- i) In internal assessment, different tools may be employed one or more assessment tools such as objective tests, written test, assignments, paper presentation, laboratory work, etc. suitable to the courses.
- ii) The students shall be informed in advance about the nature of assessment. Students shall compulsorily attend internal assessment, failing which they will not be allowed to appear for the End-semester examination. A student connot repeat In-semester examinations. The department may arrange special Insemester examination whenever necessary.



- e) i) There shall be one End semester examination carrying 80% Marks in each course of a Semester covering the entire syllabus prescribed for the course. The End semester examination/Project Work/ Dissertation.
 - ii) The Controller of Examinations shall then make necessary arrengements for notifying the dates of the end semester examinations and other procedures as per Dibrugarh University Rules (at least 20 days in advance) and the Academic Calendar notified by the University.
 - iii) Normally, the end semester examination for each course shall be of three hour duration.
- f) Setting of question papers, moderation of question papers, evaluation of answer scripts, scrutiny, tabulation of marks, etc. and announcement of results, shall be governed by the Dibrugarh University Examination Ordinance 1972 (as amended upto date)
- g) **Practical Examination:** Practical Examinations of a Semester shall be held prior to the End Semester Examination.
- h) **Betterment Examination:**(I) A student shall be entitled to take the "betterment examinations" in any two theory papers of any of the six semesters after passing the Sixth Semester Examination only once. In this case, the higher marks secured by the student shall be retained. The candidates shall have to apply for betterment examination within one year of passing the Sixth Semester Examination. (II) No betterment shall be allowed in the Practical Examination. (i) Any difficulty which may arise in the course of operation of these regulations relating to holding of examinations shall be removed by the Examination Committee of the Dibrugarh University.

RULES FOR INTERNAL ASSESSMENT IN B.A./B.SC./B.COM. PROGRAMMES (OLD) UNDER SEMESTER SYSTEM:

- 1. The marks alloted for Internal Assessment (20%) in each course shall be based on the following:
 - a] Sessional Examination-I (Written)-25% of the marks alloted for internal assessment.
 - b] Sessional Examination-II (Written)-25% of the marks alloted for internal assessment.
 - c] Seminar/Group Discussion-25% of the marks alloted for internal assessment.
 - d] Attendence in the classes held 25% of the marks alloted for internal assessment.



Each sessional examination shall be conducted by the concerned teacher(s) of the subject / paper. The setting of question paper, invigilation duty, evaluation of answerscripts for each paper shall be done by the concerned teacher(s) as a part of his/her/their normal duty. The college will fix the date of the sessional examination of each course complying with the Academic Calendar of the University. The students shall have to write the answers in the scripts provided and duly authenticated by the college/institute concerned.

- After evaluation, the answerscripts should be shown to the students and corrections should be made if necessary. After this, the answer scripts should be collected back from the students.
- 3. There shall be no provision for "repeat"/"betterment" in the sessional examination. If a student misses any sessional examination for unavoidable reasons, the concerned teachers may allow the student to appear in a separate examination at his/her own discretion.
- 4. The marks of internal assessment secured by a candidate shall be carried over to next legitimate chances.
- 5. If a course is taught by more than one teacher then the concerned teachers shall combinely conduct the process of internal assessment.
- 6. If any student fails to appear in internal assessment, he/she shall not be eligible to appear in the end semester examinations of the course(s) concerned. The colleges/institutes shall notify the same prior to filling up of forms for examinations.
- 7. At the end of the semester (before the end-semester examination begins) the concerned college shall submit the internal assessment marks in proper mark sheets to the University. The University may call the answer scripts from the colleges/institutes at any time during the academic session.

Separate formats have been designed for both the students and parents.
